



Countdown

A Lent Activity Paper Chain


Help your family internalize Jesus' sacrifice and resurrection with a fun, kid-friendly Lent paper chain! We've got engaging activities on our countdown to Easter—allowing you to build anticipation and introduce spiritual disciplines for a lifetime.

Tip: Lent doesn't include Sundays. They're celebrations of Jesus' death and resurrection, not days of the historical fast. But if you want to keep the momentum going, we've included Sundays as a bonus!






30 Monday		Read Romans 5:8. Can you believe Jesus died for us while we were His enemies? Today, pray for someone who sometimes isn't nice to you.
29 Tuesday		Read Isaiah 53:3. While Jesus was dying, people didn't even want to look at Him; they hid their faces. Can you think of something else that isn't beautiful to look at, but is beautiful on the inside?
28 Wednesday		As we continue humbling ourselves, it's good to think about how we all sin against God and how good the gift of Jesus is. On YouTube, look up Seeds Family Worship's song, "Romans 3:23/6:23 - All Have Sinned."
27 Thursday		Have you been fasting for Lent? Is it easier or harder than you thought?
26 Friday		Lent reflects on the time Jesus fasted for 40 days in the wilderness by himself. Build a fort (of cushions, sheets; under a table) in your house or even outside. Spend some time alone and even being quiet today, praying in your fort.
25 Saturday	888	Using Legos, stuffed animals, or another toy, show what it might have looked like when Jesus prayed in the wilderness for 40 days.



19 Saturday	A	Read John 2:19-20—and then build a "temple" with blocks, Legos, Lincoln Logs, or even cushions. Jesus said God's real temple wasn't one that people built. It was his own body—and he would rebuild God's temple in three days! What did he mean? (If you want, you can smash and rebuild your "temple"but you don't have to take three days.)
Sunday		All through the Old Testament, God leaves clues that Jesus is coming! It's like a red thread that God weaves through the Old Testament. In a children's Bible (or straight from the Bible in Genesis 22:1-19), read the story of Abraham being asked to sacrifice his son, Isaac. Can you see any "red threads" here?
18 Monday		Remember how God put the "red thread" of clues about Jesus throughout the Old Testament? Parent: Weave some red yarn or thread around a room of your house. Have your child wind up the yarn as they find its trail.
17 Tuesday		Elementary kids and older: Watch the video "The Test" from TheBibleProject.com. Think about Abraham being asked to sacrifice Isaac. Why might God have been testing Abraham this way?
16 Wednesday		Passover begins soon. Read the story of Passover in a children's Bible, then dip a paintbrush in water and (with an adult's help) brush it over your door.
15 Thursday		In the New Testament, "leaven"—something that makes bread rise and get puffy, like yeast—was sometimes compared to sin, because both sin and yeast grow. At Passover, Jews couldn't have any yeast in their houses. They also didn't use leaven because God told them to be ready to leave Egypt; they didn't have time for bread to rise! Look up a recipe for easy matzoh, and ask a parent if you can make some.

14 Friday	Did you know Judas' betrayal of Jesus was prophesied hundreds of years before it happened? Read Zechariah 11:12–13 and see if you can find 30 coins in your house. If you want, act out the betrayal with a sibling (Matthew 26:14–15, Matthew 27:9–10).
13 Saturday	During the first Passover, the Israelites were slaves. Read John 8:34. Without Jesus, what are we slaves to? (Sin.)
Sunday	Read John 10:9. Why does Jesus call himself a door? Check out Seeds Family Worship's "John 10:9 - I Am The Door" on YouTube.
12 Monday	Next Sunday, we'll celebrate "Palm Sunday"—a day when people had a parade for Jesus because they wanted Him to be king. Today, trace around your hand, and flip the drawing so the outline of your fingers points to your tummy. Make a donkey: your thumb is the donkey's head, and your fingers are its legs (don't forget the tail!). As you color, your parent can read Zechariah 9:9.
11 Tuesday	When Jesus died, soldiers made a crown for Him, to make fun of Him being the "King of the Jews"—only they made it out of thorns that really hurt. Try making a crown of thorns out of a paper plate with the inside circle cut out. Color or paint it brown.
10 Wednesday	Jesus died on a Jewish holiday called Passover. When people celebrate Passover today, they eat a dish called "charoset" made of apples and nuts that remind them of the bricks and mortar Jews used as slaves in Egypt. Why is it important to remember they were slaves? (<i>They need to remember how God saved them!</i>) With a parent's permission, look up and make an easy recipe for charoset.

9 Thursday	Next Thursday is the Thursday before Easter. That's when Jesus had His last dinner with His disciples. During that meal, He did something funny: He washed His disciples' dirty, stinky feet! He showed them that even though He was God, He would serve them. He considered Himself below them. Today, wash each other's feet to remind you that, like Jesus, we treat others as more important.
Friday	Today, if you have seeds somewhere in your house, plant one in some dirt you've put in an eggshell. Seeds remind us that even though they're buried and we can't see them, they make new life! Who else can you think of that brought new life after they were buried? (<i>Jesus!</i>)
7 Saturday	Next Saturday, we'll remember the day Jesus was buried. When Jewish kids eat Passover dinner, they play a game where an adult hides a cracker folded in a cloth napkin. It's a game to find something "buried." Parents: hide the cracker before a meal.
Palm Su	Read Matthew 21:1-11 together. Lay out your jackets, and take turns walking across them. Why do you think people put their coats down for Jesus? Why were they excited? (They wanted Jesus to be their King. They were tired and angry of the Romans being in charge.)
6 Monday	Do you think it's ever good to be angry? On the Monday before Easter, Jesus went into the Temple and got REALLY ANGRY. Read what happened in Matthew 21:12-16. Why was Jesus so angry? (People were cheating in God's house and costing the poor a lot of money to buy animals to worship. That's like stealing from people who come to worship God!) What things are okay to be angry about? (When someone is hurt by someone else, etc.) The Pharisees were angry, too. Why were they angry? (They didn't want people thinking Jesus was God and praising Him.)
5 Tuesday	Parents: Using a white crayon or pencil on a black piece of paper, draw a cross one to two inches wide and about eight inches tall. Grab a box of toothpicks, and let kids glue toothpicks into the shape of the cross, covering it. Ask kids, "Do you think Jesus knew He would die on a cross?" Read Mark 9:30-32 together to find out.



The Friday before Easter was the saddest day of all time: Jesus, God's Son, died on a cross. Why was this the best and the worst day ever? Wear something black today and tomorrow to remind you these are sad days, because Jesus needed to die for our sins.

What's one time you had to trust God when you were afraid? On the Saturday before Easter, Jesus' friends and disciples didn't know He was going to rise again. They thought He was just ... dead. They didn't know they were waiting. They just had to trust God with all their questions. Today, decide on something good you will skip—like a snack, or dessert—so you can remember what it was like for the disciples to wait. What will you skip?
